

Manhattan Project National Historical Park Introduction

- Established in 2015
- Located in 3 states: New Mexico, Tennessee, Washington

Operated as a partnership between the National Park Service (NPS) and the

Department of Energy (DOE)

NPS:

- Interpretation
- Advisory role in historic preservation

DOE:


- Operate and maintain park facilities
- Provide visitor access
- Development of Interpretive Plan is a high priority for the park





Park Interpretive Themes (NPS)

- Secret Cities, Sacrifice, Displacement
- Big Science
- Incomprehensible Destructive Power, Consequences
- Dawn of the Nuclear Age





NPS Stakeholder Engagement: Purpose

- Inform interpretive planning process.
- Engage the public in developing dialogue about the Manhattan Project and its many complex legacies.
- Reach out to underrepresented or non-represented groups to contribute to a broader script with diverse perspectives.
- Provide park interpretive themes as a framework for discussion.
- Significant dichotomies:
 - Health issues / Health benefits
 - Economic benefits / Environmental damage
 - Patriotism & Unity / Distrust of the government
 - Community development / Loss of land
